Burn Barrel Information

The Department of Natural Resources strongly discourages individual property owners from outdoor burning, and encourages recycling as a safer and environment friendly alternative.

Only dry, clean and untreated paper and wood products which are not recyclable are legal to be burned in a barrel.

Burning of plastics, garbage, asphalt, treated, or painted wood, rubber, or oily substances is prohibited.

If you still wish to use a burn barrel follow these guidelines to ensure your barrel does not cause a wildfire:

- Get a burning permit and adhere to the restrictions on the permit!
- Barrel MUST be covered with a lid or screen with holes ¼ inch or smaller.
- Vent or drainage holes in sides and bottom of barrel should be no larger than ¼ inch.
- Provide an area free of flammable material 6-10 feet around the barrel.
- Have water and fire fighting tools on hand.
- **Do not** burn when it's windy.
- Never leave your fire unattended and make sure it is cold before you leave.

You must also comply with local ordinances, which may be more restrictive than state law

Burn Pile Information

The Department of Natural Resources strongly discourages individual property owners from outdoor burning, and encourages recycling as a safer and environment friendly alternative.

Only dry, clean and untreated paper and wood products which are not recyclable are legal to be burned in a burn pile.

Burning of plastics, garbage, asphalt, treated, or painted wood, rubber, or oily substances is prohibited.

If you still wish to use a burn pile follow these guidelines to ensure your pile does not cause a wildfire:

- Get a burning permit and adhere to the restrictions on the permit!
- Burn pile should be kept to 6 ft. x 6 ft. or smaller.
- Provide an area free of flammable material a minimum of 10 feet around the pile.
- Have water and fire fighting tools on hand.
- Do not burn when it's windy.
- Burn piles can hold over in roots, stumps or other material and can be rekindled at a later time.
- Never leave your fire unattended and make sure it is cold before you leave!

You must also comply with local ordinances, which may be more restrictive than state law
